Logic Model

Mission = To empower **vulnerable children, persons with disabilities, single mothers, and widows** in Uganda through inclusive education, healthcare and economic empowerment programs to reduce dependency, improve health outcomes, and foster resilience for a brighter **Eastern Uganda**.

Vision = To transform society so that every individual regardless of background or ability has equal opportunities to thrive, achieve self-reliance, and contribute meaningfully to their community.

Context: Child Care Foundation began serving the Jinja District of Eastern Uganda in 2012 and has since expanded to the Lolwe Island, Namayingo, and Mayunge Districts. Individuals and families in this region face ongoing civil strife, limited economic opportunities, high rates of early marriage and childbirth, and social stigma around disabilities and chronic illnesses. As the number of vulnerable children, persons with disabilities, single mothers, widows, and orphans continues to grow, few service providers exist to support them. Child Care Foundation currently reaches about 10% of the population in need. This represents a significant unmet need: an estimated 90% of vulnerable individuals in the region remain without access to comparable services, underscoring the Foundation’s potential for scale and the urgency of continued investment in program expansion.
